





BE SMART & SAVVY TO PREVENT EXPLOITATION

All too often I hear terrible stories of how a senior has been exploited, sometimes by total strangers and sometimes by relatives, even their own children! So I decided it is time to review some tips for protecting oneself from a potential tragedy. Here are some tips recommended by the Michigan Attorney General's Office:

Be alert to individuals who seem extremely interested in your personal finances.

Do not turn over your checkbook or any other financial affairs to another person unless you have established trust in them. Even so, it is good if possible to have two parties so there are checks and balances. Whenever possible these two parties should be a family member or close friend/ advisor of many years.

Protect important information, such as your social security number and medical information.

Do not give out personal information over the phone or take unsolicited phone calls.

Be aware that fraudsters may have set up a fake website while pretending to be a reputable agency or company. Always call the organization directly rather than taking someone's word for it. Do not respond to solicitations on the internet. Scammers come from all countries. If someone is really a prince or coming into huge sums of money they do not need your help!

And, most of all, remember:

"IF IT SEEMS TOO GOOD TO BE TRUE IT IS!"



What's Happening in August in DETROIT!

Summer is slowly drawing to an end – before you stow away the flip-flops and shorts, check out these 14 things to do in August in metro Detroit.



1. Historic Base Ball Games

Through Aug. 21 (Sat. and Sun., free with admission) Greenfield Village at The Henry Ford

The games are played entirely by 1867 rules. Spectators watch from a grassy hillside, and the music is live, 19th-century specific. Pure, original baseball.

2. The Magical History Tour: A Beatles Memorabilia Exhibition

Through Sept. 18

Henry Ford Museum at The Henry Ford

Check this out: the original drum kit from the Quarrymen, the breakup letter typed by John to Paul's lawyer, neverbefore-seen tour photos and even the album John signed to his would-be killer. A sensational collection of memorabilia that aids in telling their incredible story.

3. Holocaust by Bullets

Through Dec. 31

Holocaust Memorial Center

This exhibit chronicles a lesser-known side of the Holocaust in which more than 2 million Jews were gunned down and left in unmarked mass graves across Ukraine, Belarus and Russia. Somber, yes, but educational and relevant.

4. Allen Park Street Fair

Aug. 5-6

Downtown Allen Park

Awards are given out for the best-in-show booth in three categories: art, photography and jewelry. Entertainment for the whole family provided.

5. Buy Michigan Now Fest

Aug. 5-7

Main and Center streets, downtown Northville

A highlight of Michigan-based businesses and Michigan-made products, this street fair is designed to enhance the local economy one purchase at a time. Includes live music, street vendors, children's activities and food.

6. Dearborn Homecoming

Aug. 5-7

Ford Field Park

All in the name of 30 Dearborn-based nonprofit companies raising money, there'll be a carnival, food, music and fireworks.

7. Clinton Township Gratiot Cruise

Aug. 7

Gratiot Avenue from 14 Mile Road to north of Metropolitan Parkway, Clinton Township Grab a curbside seat, and watch the parade of golden oldies — as well as new, original designs — that'll have you elbowing your friends and telling them they gotta look.

8. <u>Detroit Improv Festival</u>

Aug. 10-14

Ferndale

Ferndale's Go Comedy! is the area's strongest supporter of improvisational comedy, and it hosts a four-day festival that includes many shows and workshops, too.

Pierogi Fest

Aug. 12-14

Sweetest Heart of Mary Church

This annual festival reflects the big influence Polish culture has had on Detroit through really good food, music and tons of games for the kids (including the beloved dunk tank).

10. Ribs and R&B Music Festival

Aug. 12-14

Hart Plaza

Families flock to taste the latest grilled sensations prepared by our featured "ribbers." They eat, drink, shop and revel in the festive atmosphere created by the summer's hottest entertainment lineup with popular starstudded national acts.

11. 2016 U.S. Amateur Championship

Aug. 15-21

Oakland Hills Country Club

Come and watch the best amateur golfers in the world at the oldest golf championship in this country.

12. Armada Fair

Aug. 15-21

Armada Fairgrounds

A street fair that feels more like a circus, smells more like a carnival and is as colorful as a roller coaster is fun. They've got tents and nets, rides and cotton candy, games, barkers, live music and barnyard animals, too.

13. African World Festival

Aug. 19-21

Charles H. Wright Museum of African American History

The Wright Museum stands alone as the premier archivist of African-American culture and history. This fest features crafts, food, music and something of an education, too. All outside on the summer grounds of the museum.

14. Woodward Dream Cruise

Aug. 20

Woodward Avenue from Ferndale to Pontiac

Make a Vinegar Trap to Get Rid of Fruit Flies



A Cheap and Effective Way to Trap Breeding Fruit Flies

Got fruit flies? Ugh. All it takes is one piece of rotting fruit, and you can find yourself with a maddening fruit fly infestation in your kitchen. Even if you throw out your produce and clean your kitchen, the fruit flies may persist. The best way to control fruit flies at this point is to get rid of the breeding adults. You can make a simple vinegar trap to catch and kill fruit flies that just won't go away.

Fortunately, fruit flies aren't very bright. The adults spend all their time focused on two goals: mating and laying eggs on rotting fruit. They use their sense of smell to find fermenting produce, and will fly to their target with little regard for their own safety. That's why a vinegar trap is so effective. The trap is designed to lure the fruit flies in, and to prevent them from escaping.

To make a vinegar trap for fruit flies, you'll need just a few things (and you probably already have them in your home):

- a glass or cup
- a plastic baggie large enough to fit over the glass
- a rubber band
- scissors
- apple cider vinegar

Pour a small amount – an inch or so – of apple cider vinegar into the glass. The cider vinegar has a nice, fruity aroma that fruit flies simply cannot resist. Using the scissors, snip the corner off the plastic baggie. This should created a hole just large enough for fruit flies to pass through, but not so large that it will be easy for them to escape.

Place the baggie over the glass, and position the hole you've cut over the center. Push the snipped corner down into the glass so the baggie forms a funnel in the glass, but doesn't touch the vinegar. Use the rubber band to secure the baggie to the glass.

Place your vinegar trap in the area where you see the most fruit flies – near your garbage, produce bins, or compost container. If you have a heavy fruit fly infestation, you might want to make several vinegar traps, and place them around your kitchen and in other rooms where fruit flies are present.

Fruit flies will fly into the glass, pass through the hole in the baggie, and become trapped in the glass. Within a few days, you should notice an accumulation of dead fruit flies floating in the vinegar. Empty the trap as needed, and refill it with fresh apple cider vinegar. A few well-placed vinegar traps, along with good housekeeping practices to discourage fruit flies, should get your infestation under control quickly.
