MI Transit Plan Approval Urgent for Seniors By Matt Helms, Detroit Free Press

Ahead of the regional vote on a 4.7 billion expansion of mass transit in southeast Michigan this fall, advocates highlighted the lack of mobility options for the growing number of seniors who outlive their

ability to drive.

A coalition for Transit, a group supported by business, civic and community leaders, said at a news conference that metro Detroit's inadequate public transit poorly serves everyone who lives in the region, but particularly the estimated 20% of seniors 65 and older who can no longer drive.

The coalition said that seniors on average outlive their ability to drive by 7-10 years and nearly 70% (roughly 445,000 people) have little or no access to public transportation in the suburbs cities and of Wayne, Oakland, Macomb and Washtenaw That makes it difficult for counties. seniors to to doctors' get appointments, grocery stores and social events.

called the **Nov. 8 vote** on the 20-year plan for expanded transit crucial to providing safe, reliable and connected transit in a region with one of the lowest levels of funding among big U.S. cities. He went on to say, "It's a huge opportunity...to finally address in a comprehensive and rational way these needs."

Jewish Family Service provides and programs assistance 12,000 in metro Detroit, including door-to-door transportation crosses city and county lines so seniors can get where they need to Its metro Detroit Senior Director of older adult services, Julia Gaydayenko, "We have to turn people away every day. We can't fit them on the schedule. We don't have the capacity. sometimes people are stuck in their home."

Voters in the four counties will be asked in November to approve a 20 year, 1.2 mil. property tax to pay for the transit expansion which will cost the average homeowner about \$95/yr. In addition to the major rapid bus transit lines the plan calls for express bus service to Metro Airport, commuter rail between Detroit and Ann Arbor, expanded cross-county bus lines and localized transit for outlying areas of the counties as well.

Paul Bridgewater, President and CEO of Detroit Area Agency of Aging (DAAA) said that the region can't afford to let the transit millage fail. We can and must do better."

A Living Memorial

During a recent visit to the Village of Sage Grove in Kalamazoo, Administrator Paula Hager took me for a stroll through their community garden to see their newly planted Living Memorial Tree. The idea for the tree sprang from a comment Paula overheard during the funeral of a resident who had recently died. Reflecting on the person who had passed, she heard someone remark, "we should plant a tree." That simple comment put into motion what this spring and summer became, a community wide effort to create an accessible space on the campus to honor the residents who spent the last years of their lives at the Village.

A local supplier provided the concrete for the walkway; a local contractor provided the labor to build the walkway; and a local nursery provided the tree. And others donated anonymously to the project. In the end, the Sage Grove did more than just plant a tree. They mobilized the community by building a lasting memorial to the villages past. Management created a space for current residents, friends and family to renew themselves spiritually because when it comes to wellness, you hear a lot about mind and body, but you rarely hear about the spirit.

This is only one of many examples of how our residents at PVM honor the past, present and future. Let's find a way to tell your story.

Maintenance Corner

- Do not put boxes down the garbage chute. Breakdown ALL boxes and place them in the first floor level refuse room
- Do not leave trash and untied garbage bags on the floors of any refuse room.

Overnight Guests

Residents MUST complete the Extended Guest Form when a visiting guest(s) stays at the resident's unit for an extended time. An extended guest is defined as 1) anyone staying in a resident's unit during the hours of 10 pm through 8 am and, or, 2) anyone staying at the resident's unit for an extended period of time of 7 hours or more.

All resident's guests are allowed to stay no more than 21 days per year.
