President's Day Facts

Featured Articles

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- --George Washington was the only president unanimously elected. -Meaning all of the state representatives voted for him.
- --John Adams died on the same day as Thomas Jefferson, July 4th, 1826. This day was also the 50th anniversary of the approval of the Declaration of Independence!
- -- Thomas Jefferson was also an accomplished architect. He designed his famous home at Monticello as well as buildings for the University of Virginia.
- -- James Madison and George Washington are the only presidents who signed the Constitution.
- -- James Madison was the shortest president at 5 feet 4 inches tall and weighed 100 pounds. Abraham Lincoln was the tallest president at 6 feet 4 inches tall (Lyndon B. Johnson was also 6' 4").
- -- James Monroe was the 5th president, but the 3rd to die on the 4th of July.
- --On the day he was shot, Lincoln told his bodyguard that he had dreamt he would be assassinated.
- --Franklin D. Roosevelt met President Grover Cleveland when he was five years old. Cleveland said "I am making a wish for you. It is that you may never become president of the United States".

- --Franklin D. Roosevelt was the first president to appear on television during a 1939 broadcast from the World's Fair.
- --At 42 years, 10 months, 18 days old Teddy Roosevelt was the youngest man to hold the office of president. Ronald Reagan was the oldest at 69 years 11 months. John F. Kennedy was the youngest to be elected president.
- --Teddy Roosevelt was blind in his left eye due to an injury in a boxing match.
- --When Ronald Reagan was shot by an assassin in 1981, he joked "I forgot to
- -- The "S" in Harry S. Truman does not stand for anything.
- --Woodrow Wilson was buried at the Washington National Cathedral. He is the only president buried in Washington D.C. --Andrew Jackson was shot in the chest during a gun dual, but managed to stay standing and shoot and kill his opponent. The bullet could not be safely removed and remained in his chest for the next 40 vears.
- --George W. Bush and Donald Trump are the only presidents to have earned a Master of Business Administration (MBA) degree.

Maintenance Updates

- You must report all work orders as they happen. Please do not ignore repair issues within your apartment. You will be responsible to pay for any damage that is caused by your neglect.
- You cannot place ANY item in front of your breaker panel in the kitchen, your furnace closet or window in the living room. This is a REAC violation. If we notice any item blocking them, you will receive a lease violation.
- You must be clothed when we come to your apartment to do work. If you have requested service or if we have sent a notice that we will be by, you need to be sure to have clothes on. Not robes or see through gowns. Lease violations will be written if you are not. No exceptions.
- You cannot place any item on the stove that is not designed for cooking. All other items are fire hazards. If we notice anything on or near your stove that is flammable, you will be receiving a lease violation.
- Boxes are to be broken down flat and placed on the trash room floor. Large items must be disposed of by your friends or family. Trash bags need to be tied and placed in the barrels or down the chute. We have sent enough reminders for everyone to be aware. Lease violations will be sent if you do not comply with the house rules.
- NO ONE should be in the laundry room before 8:00 am or after 8:00 pm. No exceptions. No excuses. Lease violations will be issued.
- If you have a health emergency, you or your family members should press your personal help button or call 911.
- If there is a fire emergency you should call 911.
- If your smoke detector is going off because of burned food and it is after hours, please call 911 to let them know. The fire dept. will still respond to reset your alarm but they won't need to send the big truck and a slew of volunteers. Thank you for your continued cooperation.



Did You Know?

If you are among the 500,000 plus Americans who undergo open-heart surgery each year, then you have Dr. Daniel Hale Williams to thank for it. Defying conventional wisdom and against all odds, Dr. Williams successfully stitched together a tear in the heart lining of a young stabbing victim, which by today's standards would be considered routine. What makes this operation remarkable is that it took place in 1893! Anesthetics were primitive, there were no antibiotics, and blood transfusion had yet to be perfected.





Despite the risk, Dr. Williams opened the victim's chest and performed the surgery. Unlike his predecessors, however, he used early antiseptic methods to cleanse the repaired wound before re-closing the chest. Fifty-one days later the victim left the hospital infection free, and lived another 20 years. Until that time, patients who had their chests surgically opened died days later usually from massive infection. Thanks to Dr. Williams' pioneering surgical techniques and use of antiseptics, no longer was open-heart surgery considered to be an automatic death sentence.

In addition to being the first physician to successfully perform open-heart surgery, Dr. Williams founded Provident Hospital in Chicago, the nation's first interracial hospital and nurse training school. He was also the first African American physician to be inducted into the American College of Surgeons. This February, as we celebrate both Heart Health Month and Black History Month we owe Dr. Williams a debt of gratitude for making the seemingly impossible possible and saving countless lives as a result.

Creamy Ham and White Bean Tortellini Soup





- 3 tablespoons butter
- 2 tablespoons olive oil
- ½ large onion, chopped
- 2 carrots thinly sliced
- 2 stalks celery, chopped
- 4 garlic cloves, minced
- 1/3 cup flour
- 6 cups low sodium chicken broth, divided
- 2 tablespoons cornstarch
- 2 cups cooked and cubed ham
- 1 15 ounce can cannellini beans, rinsed and drained
- 1 tablespoon Dijon mustard
- 2 bay leaves
- 1 tablespoon chicken bouillon
- 1 teaspoon dried parsley
- ½ teaspoon EACH dried oregano, dried thyme, ground cumin
- ¼ teaspoon pepper
- ¼ teaspoon red pepper flakes (optional)
- 4 cups (one lb.) uncooked refrigerator cheese tortellini
- 2-3 cups half and half



- Melt butter and olive oil in Dutch oven/large soup pot over medium high heat. Add onions and sauté for 2 minutes. Add carrots and celery and cook, while stirring, for 3 minutes. Add garlic and sauté for 30 seconds. Sprinkle in flour then cook, stirring constantly for 3 minutes (it will be thick).
- Turn heat to low and gradually stir in 5 ½ cups of chicken broth. Whisk 2 tablespoons cornstarch with remaining ½ cup chicken broth and add to soup. Stir in ham, beans, Dijon mustard, bay leaves, bouillon and all remaining herbs and spices.
- Bring to a boil; cover and reduce to a gentle simmer for 15-20 minutes or until vegetables are tender.
- Add tortellini and boil for 1-2 minutes or until cooked al denté.
- Stir in half and half, adding additional half and half or broth if desired for a less "chunky" soup and warm through.
- Garnish individual servings with fresh parsley and parmesan cheese if desired.
